Goals of Access Monitoring

- Actionable
 - Measures should be meaningful to beneficiaries and actionable for states and plans
- Comparable
 - Measures (for both acute care and long-term care) should be comparable across delivery systems and states

Goals of Access Monitoring

- Timely
 - Timely enough to detect problems and intervene appropriately
- Efficient
 - Minimize administrative burden
 - Build on existing systems and data
- Adaptable
 - Allow for modification and updating over time

Key Elements: Access Measures

- Provider availability and accessibility
- Beneficiary utilization
- Beneficiary perceptions and experiences

Key Elements: Roles and Responsibilities

- Federal and state roles in designing and implementing an access monitoring system
- Engaging stakeholders and transparency

Key Elements: Design Considerations

- Process and timeline
- Prioritization
- Cost
